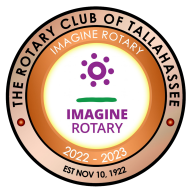

History Nugget

From 1953 to 1954, Blair Stone served as president of the Rotary Club of Tallahassee and also presided over the Leon County Community Council. Tallahassee's population had grown from 5,637 in 1920 to 10,700 by 1930, 16,240 by 1940, and reached 27,237 in 1950 when Lake Ella still marked the northern edge of town.

MAJOR SERVICE PROJECTS THROUGH THE YEARS

Pat Chapman died while playing golf at Capital City Country Club and his year was taken over by Klein Wigginton in 1970-71. The most satisfying accomplishment was centered around the FSU scholarship house. The club had previously assumed a mortgage obligation to finance the scholarship house. On May 3, 1971, Pres. Wigginton reported to the board that he had received a receipt and a letter of thanks from the Southern Scholarship and Research Foundation for the final payment on the Rotary scholarship house. The final payment of \$1500 was paid off in 1971 and the mortgage was burned in a galvanized bucket at a regular club meeting.

In 1971, the club, in coordination with the Junior League of Tallahassee, supported through funding and considerable coordination organization of the school for retarded children -- called the Candle of Hope School. The school was for poor children and after organization was supported by state and federal funding. Later in September 1972, the school was taken over by the Leon County school system and renamed the Gretchen Everhart school. It has since played an important role in the Leon County educational system.
